Session met this past Sunday, June 22, after the amazing Armando wrapped up his finale Adult Education class before he and his family leave for California (for a photo, see page 11). We gathered the tables and chairs into a square, as close as we could get to a round-table of God’s chosen leaders; and opened the meeting with devotions brought by Elder Christina Mead. Her devotions opened with the thought-provoking information that the word *amateur* comes from Latin: *amator*, meaning a lover. One who does what they do for love.

She said many other fine things, and I took a note or two on what followed as well, but what I found myself thinking later on my drive home was that my pride in being an amateur was significantly greater. In her devotions, Christina reminded us that we need not be perfect at what we do with our time. We might do something simply because we enjoy it, in that it gives us joy. Which made me think perhaps I am a professional Christian as well, and aren’t we all, really...

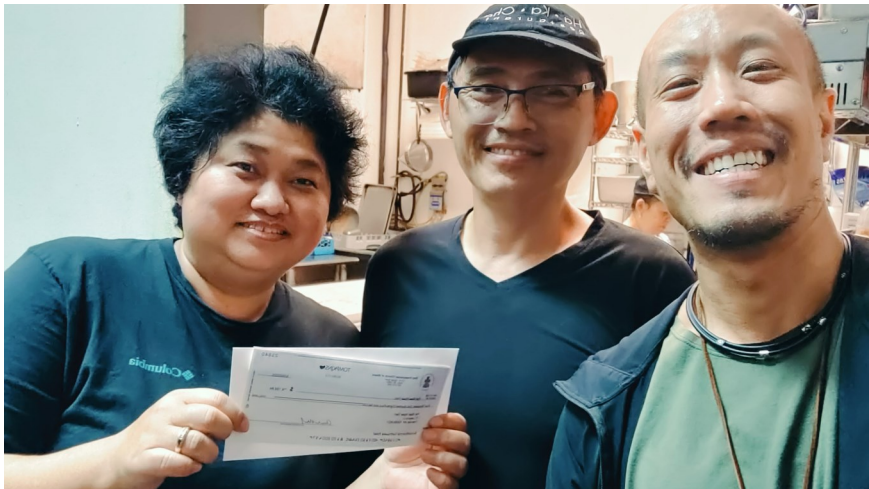

Report from Finance: Fiscal Year 2024 Financials

As many members heard at the annual meeting earlier this spring, our bookkeeper has been working hard on getting the church's financial records caught up after two years of transition in bookkeeping staff. Her valiant efforts have paid off, and we're happy to be able to report on the church's finances as of December 31, 2024.

As you peruse the profit and loss statement and catalog of the church's assets presented below, please note that 2024 was the first of two transitional years as we shift the church's bookkeeping to align with new Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). GAAP, the guidelines that govern how organizations keep their books, changed a few years ago to require that organizations report income differently than in the past. Under earlier guidelines, some income that the church received was not recognized on the profit and loss statement (P & L). If the income was "off-budget," like unexpected gifts or bequests, we accounted for it in accounts on the balance sheet, not the P& L. Now, we must recognize all income on the profit and loss statement when it is received, whether we budgeted for it or not. For that reason, you will see two new income accounts on the 2024 P & L: 3016 · Restricted Gifts and 3018 · Bequests. We have provided two different figures for net income at the bottom of the P & L: one, the actual net income, and one an adjusted amount that takes out these new accounts so that one can better see how our net income compares with our budget.

In 2024, most expenses came in close to or under budget. The exception was expenses under Buildings and Properties, which went over budget due to unexpected and necessary repairs, particularly to the roof (roof repair is under line 6501 · Annual Contracts). However, most of these large expenses are covered by gifts that came in in other fiscal years. \$50,000 of the roof repair will be covered by a gift we received in 2025 to help pay for the roof expenses. \$29,000 of line 6700 · Church Bldg went to a deposit on the sidewalk/ramp work to be completed in 2025 (we hope!). Funds for this sidewalk work were donated in 2023. Even with these large variations from the budget, total actual expenses came in at 101% of the budgeted expenses.

Finally, a note on the balance sheet. Some of the funds that the church holds as assets came from restricted gifts. This means that the funds must be used for a particular purpose, designated by the donor. Our church currently uses liability accounts on the balance sheet in order to keep track of what funds are restricted for what purpose, a common practice under the earlier GAAP. The resulting balance sheet is very detailed, and it is long—it would take up several pages of the Good News! In order to save space, and because these are not true liabilities, Finance Committee is choosing to reproduce just the assets side of the balance sheet in the Good News.

An Overview of 2024 financials:

- We are following new accounting standards, so this report looks very different from the past!
- Roof repairs of \$68,000 were paid for in 2024 but mostly covered by a \$50,000 gift received in 2025.
- An advance was paid by the church in '24 of \$29,000 for an accessible path to the front of the church. The cost is covered by a gift received in '23.
- Overall, this shows we were in a healthy financial position at the end of '24. Thank you for your patience and we hope to have '25 updates soon!

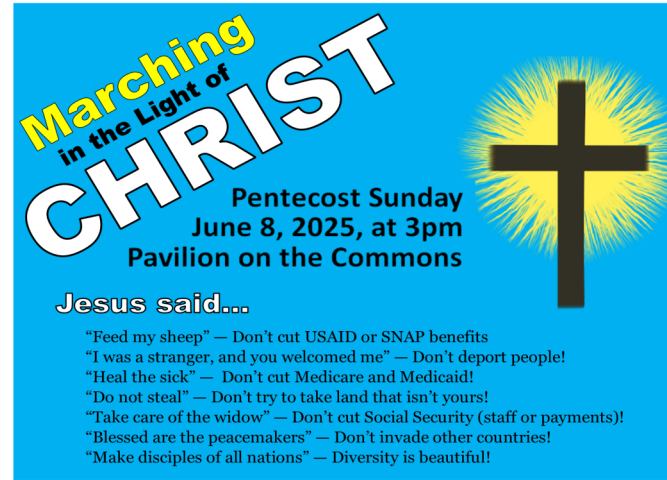
