From Pastor Cindy

Dear Friends,

It seems to me that somewhere near the beginning of my recent sermons I mention that we are in turbulent times, and we are. As I think about all that is happening in our country and in our world, I find I hear in my head that old question, "What would Jesus do?" This question began as part of a book title, In His Steps: What Would Jesus Do? by Charles Sheldon in 1896. It became popular again in the 1990's, and it is still a good question to ask.

It is a good question to ask, that is, as long as we do not presume to have a perfect and complete understanding of what he wants us to do. He does give us what I believe are some clear starting points. In just a few verses in Matthew 25 we are taught we are to welcome the stranger, feed the hungry, give drink to the thirsty, clothe the naked, take care of the sick, and visit the prisoner. While it is very simple to say these things and to want to do them, it can be a lot harder to follow through on our beliefs than we might want it to be.

Rarely do we think of following our faith as a risky commitment, but sometimes it is, and I think we are facing risks in subtle and obvious ways we may not have encountered before. When his disciples were hungry on the Sabbath, Jesus plucked some "heads of grain" to feed them even though the authorities chastised him. Jesus placed the care of his disciples, his children, above anything else in the moment. If this is what Jesus would do, it is a good place for us to start. Much of what we are facing today is complex, but when strangers need a welcome and the hungry are needing food, we know what to do. It may be that it is riskier to follow our faith than in the past, but that is when to remember we are part of a community of faith and that Jesus has promised to be with us always.

Meet John and Barbara Schwartz

In 1966 I finished graduate school with a PhD in Physics at Northwestern University in Evanston Ill. and was a Post Doctoral associate in the Cornell Engineering Physics department for 3 years. I became a faculty member at Ithaca College in the Physics department in 1969. We lived in Ithaca and bought a house next to South Hill school. We live there until 2003. We eventually bought some wooded property with access to a 13 acre pond and had a log home built. We are in the process of preparing our log home for sale, a daunting process.

My wife, Barbara, and I joined First Presbyterian Church Ithaca in the early 1977. Sue, our daughter, also joined as soon as able and attended 'Sunday school' as a youngster. Sue is a grown adult in her 40's. Sue and her husband, David, have an 8 year old son, our grandson. They live near Trumansburg.

In 1989's First Presbyterian participated in a Ministry of the Laity program that encouraged members to look at what they do on week days as a ministry of Servant Leadership. We looked at what we do as acts of leadership following Jesus' teaching. The goal was to serve others. Not to proselytize, convert people. We had to think about our secular lives in sacred ways. This was a seminal experience for me.

I have served as a member of the Session at First Presbyterian and as a representative of First Presbyterian Church with the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley

We are downsizing, again, after 20 years in our log home with the plan of moving closer to Trumansburg. I have rejoined First Presbyterian. Barbara, as an ordained member of the clergy, is a member of the Presbytery of Geneva.

I am a lifelong Presbyterian who grew up in Mankato, Minnesota, and graduated from PC(USA)-related Macalester College in St. Paul. In 1967 I came to Ithaca to begin graduate studies in cultural anthropology at Cornell. Shortly after arriving, I met my future husband John Schwartz, we were married in June 1968, and we continued living in Ithaca. I eventually finished my Ph.D. in 1979, after the births of our son and daughter. In the next several years, I carried out a research project on the NYS community dispute resolution system and occasionally taught anthropology classes.

John and I joined First Presbyterian Church in 1977, and our children were baptized there. In 1991 I was ordained as an elder, and I also began the Presbytery of Susquehanna Valley's commissioned lay preacher training program. Toward the end of that training, I realized I was headed for seminary. In 1993 I began M.Div. studies at Colgate Rochester Crozer Divinity School, 30 years after I was a freshman at Macalester! Theological education was a challenging and richly rewarding experience. Feeling called to spiritual direction training, I went on to complete the Diploma in Spiritual Direction program at San Francisco Theological Seminary.

During the years leading up to my 2005 ordination as a Minister of Word and Sacrament, I had a spiritual direction practice in Ithaca and did frequent lay preaching. I have served as a designated and interim pastor in Presbyterian and Lutheran (ELCA) churches, and have done extensive pulpit supply preaching in the presbyteries of Geneva and Susquehanna Valley as well as in Lutheran and UCC congregations. Although I retired officially in 2023, I still do some supply preaching.

John and I appreciate living close to our son and daughter and son-in-law, and especially our young grandson. We are lifelong environmentalists and have canoed together for over 50 years. I enjoy cooking and baking, knitting, singing in the VOICES Community Chorus, practicing Qigong and Tai Chi, and reading murder mysteries.



Mid-Year Financials

Report from the Finance Committee: Mid-Year Financials

On the next two pages, please find a budget versus actuals report and assets report for the first half of fiscal year 2025. As of June 30, we are 50% through the 2025 fiscal year. Contributions are slightly ahead of 50%, and building use income is a bit behind (as of September, more building use income has come in). Investment income seems to be very high, but this is an artifact of the church being in a transitional year between two bookkeeping systems. Readers may remember from the June **Good News** that we are starting to report all income on our profit and loss statement, rather than reporting some "off-budget" income and expenses on the balance sheet. Any investment income that was reserved for restricted purposes fell into the latter category in earlier years, but is reported here in full on the profit and loss statement. This year we are finetuning the new system, and next year our budget numbers should be closer to actuals.

Total expenses for the year are right around the 50% one would hope for on June 30. However, you can see that there is quite a range once we look at individual departments or committees. Buildings and Properties in particular was a hard budget to estimate this year. Repair costs that used to come out of accounts on the balance sheet are now appearing on the profit and loss statement. Again, learning from this year, we will have a better idea of how to budget under our new paradigm in the next fiscal year.

As with the 2024 reports, we are presenting just the asset side of the balance sheet. We are still in the process of cleaning up the many liability accounts that track the restricted funds of the church. The entire balance sheet is still very detailed, and it is long—it would take up several pages of the **Good News!** In order to save space, and because these are not true liabilities, we are reproducing just the assets side of the balance sheet in the **Good News**.

At a glance:

- The next two pages show charts of expenses and income. By budget line, you will see what has been received and spent through the end of June, and then a column showing our total annual budget for each line.
- Income currently exceeds expenses by \$55,266.
- There are a few larger expenses that do not yet appear on this statement, as it only covers through the end of June.
- Altogether we are on track to be "in the black" at the end of the year.
